### **Alumni Spotlight: Jeremy Vega**

Our last spotlight is on Jeremy Vega, a graduate of the Class of 2016. Currently, Jeremy is a direct input officer stationed at NNPTC in Charleston, South Carolina. This means he was commissioned directly out of college and then went to Officer Development School. Jeremy graduated from UC Davis in June of 2020 with a BS in Electrical Engineering, and during the times he wasn't studying, he was racing on the school's club rowing team.

#### How were you involved in the unit at the time?

Back at Troy (2012-2016), I was predominately a drill team member, but I also participated in lots of brain brawls. During my third year, I was the AX commander of Team Red. This was during the transition from being team two, the junior team to build field meet experience, to Team Red, a team that couldn't be taken lightly in area 11. During my NS-4 year, I was the Command Master Chief during the third quarter, mainly in charge of making sure the unit performed as well as possible at the Superbowl. I personally think that positions in the unit were more of a formality, and your impact was proportional to the effort you put in at all levels.

### What is a fond memory you have from ROTC?

The fondest memories I have come from drill camps and weekend practices. Controversial answer, but the field meets end up blurring in your memories from the stress associated with them. What really stands out to me now is the motivation and progress that we had on these tough weekends. No competition is ever won in a day, it takes a sustained effort that can't be faked in the night before.

### How has your experience from ROTC helped you post high school?

ROTC forced a level of interpersonal communication that not every student gets to experience. The main way it helped me post high school is the emphasis of communication through a chain of command. A student-run program can't have every kid running up to the SNSI to complain about tiny details. Conflict resolution needs to happen at the lowest level possible before moving its way up. A cadet could go to a squad leader, then up to an upperclassman, then a department head before talking to an NSI. Breaching the chain of command reflects a lack of trust between levels and overall lowers efficiency of the unit.

The six P's never left me after graduating. Proper prior planning prevents poor performance. I know that Troy's M.O. tends to be waiting until the last second to get it done. Unfortunately, during high school we tend to get away with it 9/10 times. But of course that doesn't fly after a certain point, or sometimes life gets in the way. A little bit of action a day prevents a whole lot of headache later on.

Overall, I wouldn't trade my high school experience with ROTC with any other activity because it gave me some core experiences that I could use later on in life, and friends that I'll never forget.
